Set against the backdrop of the national celebratory mood of the impending Nigerian independence and the transfer of power in the bureaucracy, Waziri is pulled into a game of cat and mouse as he and the killer try to outwit one other. The 145 minute film (released in 2014) was written by Tunde Babalola, and produced and directed by Kunle Afolayan.
